			The Precinct Committees also noted that more detail should be considered relating the various options. The draft Future Direction Report gives this framework with a clear trade-off between building height and tangible public benefits. More broadly, considering all stakeholders, there was wide support to deliver the identified demand for public benefits. However, there was a fine balance, with 50% in support of delivery of public benefits through Voluntary Planning Agreements.	
			In the <i>draft Future Direction Report</i> , an optimum outcome is presented by minimising the height uplift while still making it possible to deliver on the widely supported demand for delivering tangible public benefits. Creating more public domain for movement on ground level was identified as a great need. This in contrary to the car dominated streets with narrow footpaths that would generally be delivered within the existing controls. Also, community facilities for all ages are now specifically identified. The built form strategically locates height with greater ground floor and upper level setbacks.	
			External heritage consultancy advice has been considered in the <i>draft Future Direction Report</i> by respecting the heritage components on the existing listed heritage items and encouraging buildings of character to be integrated in potential new development.	

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			In summary, the Report recognises the complexities and nuances of the town centre and seeks to guide development pressures and leverage value from it to retain and build on its village qualities, enhance the public domain and retain and expand jobs. These targeted outcomes will simply not be achieved by the application of a 4-6 storey height limit across the board.

			The electricity is metered and charged back to the customer at the same rate that Council pays - no profit is made by Council. In the past year, there have been 531 charging sessions, and a total of 2,626.35 kw/h of electricity has been used by customers. This equates to only 4.95 kw/h of electricity per session, indicating chargers are mainly used for minor top-up of vehicle batteries. The most used chargers are those at Alexander Street Carpark, above Woolworths in Crows Nest. Broadly speaking, the carparks with a free parking period account for almost all usage.
