Summary of Actions Arising 2021 - Cremorne Point Precinct

This document is North Sydney Council's response to actions arising from Precinct Committee Minutes. On receipt of the minutes, actions are numbered and allocated to relevant Council Officers for response.

To effectively manage and provide clarity, all actions are allocated a status when reporting to Precinct Committees in response to their minutes. There are three categories:

- Awaiting Response action allotted to Council Officer response awaited.
- **Open/Ongoing** action allocated to Council Officer, initial response provided. Matter ongoing and further response/update to be provided at later date.
- **Closed for Council** Council either completed related works/tasks or has taken all reasonable steps within its power to resolve issue (for example when matter is beyond its jurisdiction). If the Precinct Committee feels Council can take further steps, they can request council reopen action.

| | 7.1 | Traffic issues at intersection of Green Street with Cremorne Road (4 Green Street) - Members do not feel that the space between the two driveways is too small for a car as it is often used for parking for cars and other vehicles. Members do not feel that the space should be designated only for motorcycles. Precinct Committee is not supportive of the parking space being changed to motorcycle only parking. | Council's Manager Traffic & Transport Operations notes that the Precinct Committee is not supportive of motorbike parking. There have a been a number of near misses reported by members in the last months. Signage complies with Australian Standards however, the double centre line marking faded near the bend. Members noted that Council has previously been advised that the area is very poorly lit and remain concerned about the safety at night in this area, particularly for young people coming off the late ferries. Painting hand rails like this adds to further maintenance in the future as the paint thins over time, chips off etc. Unless specific requests arise from consultation processes, Council place handrails in situ unpainted. If they were to be painted it needs to be carried out as a powder coat and that decision needs to be made prior to installation. It is not feasible for the handrails to be powder coated at a later date this requires them to be removed and reinstalled. | Closed for Council |

| February | Email | Traffic issues around Precinct - Intersection of Green Street with Cremorne Road 4 Green Street blocking the driveway/garage - This is situated at the intersection of Cremorne Road and Green Street. A resident has asked that this also include the single parking space between our driveways to ensure safe line of sight for oncoming traffic. I made this request in the context of my submission to the Council regarding a pending development application at 38 Cremorne Road which is attached. The reason is that ongoing development work in the area leads to oversized vehicles using this driveway area as a parking bay, often early in the morning well before 7am while the drivers wait to start work. Photos are attached and included in my submission. It creates terrible noise for residents and mess pollution as well as obstructing access to and from garages and safe line of sight of oncoming traffic. For example, cement mixers churning, metal scaffolding equipment being adjusted, loud conversations, truck motors idling | Council's Manager Traffic & Transport Operations has advised: 1. We understand you are requesting for the area in front of the driveway of No. 44 Cremorne Road to be signposted as No Stopping. The Road Rules regarding parking across a driveway (Rule 198) and No Parking (168) are the similar and infringements of these Rules attract the same penalty. No Stopping signs are generally only used where there is a safety or traffic network issue as the infringement attracts a significantly higher penalty than No Parking. No Parking allows motorists to stop for up to 2 minutes whilst remaining within 3 metres of their vehicle to load or unload passengers or goods. Therefore, residents and taxis would also be prohibited from this activity if No Stopping signs were installed. Note May 2021: Council is requested to provide a copy of the consultant's lighting strategy report/document. | Update as per SOA November 2019 Council's Traffic Operations Officer has advised that Ausgrid are responsible for supplying, installing and maintaining street lighting, including the poles and lamps. Council pays Ausgrid for this service. It is Council's responsibility to ensure that the level of lighting is compliant with the relevant Australian Standard. To meet this responsibility Council is developing a <i>Street Lighting Strategy and Masterplan</i> for the whole Local Government Area. This will include all streets and parks/reserves. Council is engaging a new lighting consultant to complete the Masterplan. The new lighting consultant will be assessing the lighting levels in all streets as part of this project. This will include the areas of concern raised by Cremorne Point Precinct Committee. UPDATE (8 June 2021) | Open/Ongoing |

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| | | | Council's Traffic Operations Officer has advised that the Lighting Strategy and Masterplan for the North Sydney LGA has been put on hold due to budget constraints. Council is responsible for all Streetlighting. All the street lights in Milson Road and Cremorne Point Reserve are Ausgrid lights. Council is Ausgrid's customer and we pay Ausgrid to install and maintain the lights. Ausgrid does not conduct audits of the lights. In the next financial year Council will be engaging a consultant lighting engineer to assess the level of lighting in Milson Road to ascertain if it meets the current Australian Standard. If it does not meet the standard we will be requesting a solution. This may be difficult due to the number of trees in the street. UPDATE (11 August 2021) Council's Traffic Operations Officer has advised that due to the current COVID restrictions Council has had to defer engaging a lighting consultant until the restrictions are lifted. This is due to the fact that investigating and assessing the level of lighting in Milson Road requires onsite inspections. | |
| | 16/8b | In addition, we have been advised that the walkway between 90-70 Milson Road on the reserve side is also a dark area - is this Ausgrid or can the council assist here? Note May 2021: As per request from Council, Precinct Committee has confirmed it is the Reserve. | Council's Manager Parks & Reserves has advised that the Precinct Committee's description suggests it's the Milson Road Footpath of which Ausgrid would have street lights on. If the Precinct Committee is referring to the path through Sirius Street Playground to Cremorne Point Reserve, Council is not aware of any lights down this path at all. 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| 2015 | 28/15 | Cremorne Point eyesore - Residents have advised Council repeatedly that the cabling and light fixture at pole (M30161), in the vicinity of Cremorne Point Wharf, continues to be an eyesore, spoiling one of the most beautiful views of Sydney from a public place by both day and night. This location has over 1 million visitors each year. This has been a long-standing item of significant concern to Precinct members. Note May 2021: Council is requested to provide an update on the status of this work. | Update as per SOA November 2019 Council's Traffic Operations Officer has advised that Council is still investigating the structure of the roadway to install Council owned lights. Update (8 June 2021) Council's Traffic Operations Officer has advised that this project had been suspended but now resurrected. A consultant lighting engineer has been engaged to have the design certified with Ausgrid and progress the project to installation of new Council lights. Update (11 August 2021) Council's Traffic Operations Officer has advised that the lighting consultant has been engaged and they have sent the lighting design for this project to Ausgrid for certification. Council is awaiting Ausgrid's response. | Open/Ongoing |
