- Closed for Council Council either completed related works/tasks or has taken all reasonable steps within its power to resolve issue (for example when matter is beyond its jurisdiction). If Precinct Committee feels Council can take further steps, they can request Council reopen action.

	Rangers Road & Spofforth St: Several residents recently attended the NSC Traffic Committee meeting of 18 October 2019 regarding the Spofforth Street and Rangers Road intersection proposal and provided the meeting with a summary. It appears that Mosman Council does not support NSC's attempts to initiate improvements to the intersection and is unable to commit any financial support for the proposal until after 2024. It was agreed this was not an ideal outcome and residents also expressed frustration that they have not been able to see any of the concept diagrams drawn up by NSC to date. It was agreed that there was extreme danger on Spofforth Street, and precinct members posed the question: "who is going to take responsibility when there is a fatal accident?" **Action:** That the on-site meeting with the Mayor of North Sydney and the Member for North Shore organised in accordance with Harrison Minutes of 5 September 2019 and scheduled for Monday 9 December [this date is after private schools have commenced vacation, can the meeting be brought forward?] be extended to include a site inspection of Spofforth Street on the same day, and that the site inspection be extended to include Ward Councillors and possibly Mosman Council representatives. related to the B-line project which is haphazard and with little co-ordination between the various contractors, Council and B-line. For example, the newly laid pavers at the corner of 148 Holt and Military Road are due to be dug up to lay cables connected with the Tidal Flow mechanism.

Precinct members asked:

Q: Why was this trench not dug before the pavers were laid?

Q: Why can't the works be better co-ordinated?

This work is also causing inconvenience to pedestrians. Several residents of Holt Ave reported having to make large, inconvenient detours due to footpath closures due to trench work on Military Road.

Concern was also expressed about safety issues to pedestrians and motorists at the intersection of Holt Avenue and Military Road. It was reported that frequently impatient drivers attempt to over-take other cars waiting in a queue for a break in traffic in order to turn left. Pedestrian safety is compromised as drivers are focused on looking right and neglect to check for pedestrians crossing the intersection from the left side. Precinct members who live on Holt Avenue residents reported that there is extensive (and increased) queuing of vehicles waiting to turn left onto Military Road.

Precinct members reported on-going problems with confusing conditions at the off-peak citybound bus stop at Cremorne Junction. The citybound bus stop has been

relocated to a temporary location closer to the Cremorne Town Centre, however it was reported that bus drivers are experiencing difficulty knowing which is the exact set down/pick up location at Cremorne. TfNSW staff were initially posted at this location to help ensure buses pulled up at the correct location. Precinct members also reported some bus drivers and passengers are confused where to wait/stop at 10 am during the change of bus stop time period. Precinct members at the meeting wondered whether the introduction of B-line had made any real difference to commuters - Northern Beaches commuters appear to have benefited from B-line with more frequent buses but no benefits for the Cremorne and Neutral Bay community. Precinct members also wondered if journey time for buses had actually improved given that congestion on York Street was still a problem.		
The Precinct passed a unanimous resolution to ask Council to suspend work on the Young Street Plaza until such time as stage 1 of the Military Road Corridor Planning Study was complete.	Council's Sustainable Transport Project Coordinator has advised that Council at its meeting of 26 August 2019 resolved: THAT a temporary or trial closure of Young Street for a period of three months take place early in 2020 (subject to necessary approvals) and the outcomes of community feedback during the trial are reported to Council. B-line - update: Precinct Committee members reported various personal observations regarding local conditions with the Tidal Flow in operation.

Tidal Flow has made no significant difference to flow of traffic through Cremorne city bound, but many issues were reported:

• Tidal Flow has created a new pinchpoint - significant outbound (eastbound in Mosman direction) congestion with some mornings traffic banked up to Winnie Street and beyond to Neutral Bay.

Safety issues at Cremorne:

- The Spofforth St intersection is often blocked by cars causing danger to pedestrians
- Buses are travelling faster on dedicated bus lanes, and often 'running through' Cremorne intersections on red light.
- One pedestrian injury reported already at the Spofforth St/Military Road intersection.
- Mosman Daily reported that RMS will install a red light camera at the Spofforth St intersection near Glover St.
- Some vehicles are making illegal right turns into Cabramatta instead of proceeding to turn at Spofforth St
- 14 safety issues were reported in the original RMS safety report

Commuter issues:

- Confusion by bus drivers and passengers about where to stop/stand during the AM bus stop changeover period (10am)
- 225 bus is affected by the congestion

Q: is it possible for Council/RMS to measure the speed of traffic on Military Road and on feeder streets eg and Holt Avenue, Spofforth St.

Council's Manager Traffic and Transport Operations has advised that Council is planning to collect volume and speed traffic counts on local roads shortly to compare with baseline data collected before the tidal flow went in. This will include Holt Avenue and Spofforth Street as well as other surrounding streets.

Military Road is a State road so Precinct Committee can enquire with B-Line or RMS regarding speed data.
