# PURPOSE:

The purpose of this report is to seek Council's endorsement of the recommended winners of the North Sydney Community Awards 2024.

## **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:**

- North Sydney Council conducts an annual community awards event to recognise individuals and groups who have made outstanding contributions during the year to the quality of life and health of the environment in the North Sydney Local Government Area. Nominations for these awards opened 9 October 2023 and closed 12 February 2024.
- The Community Awards Selection Panel (comprising the Mayor and representatives of key departments across Council) met 20 February 2024 to select category winners. This report seeks Council endorsement of the recommended winners for 2024.

# Background

North Sydney Council conducts an annual community awards event to recognise individuals and groups who have made outstanding contributions during the year to the quality of life, health of the environment, and spirit in the North Sydney community.

In 2020, Council launched a revitalised North Sydney Community Awards program to signify the unique character of North Sydney, acknowledge the value of all nominations submitted, and highlight the bedrock of grassroots volunteering in the North Sydney community. New categories for the awards were also introduced.

#### Report

Five award categories formed part of the nomination process for a contribution by an individual or community group within the last 12 months (or for more than 20 years in the Living Legend Award category). The five award categories are:

#### Community Builder

This person or group is the glue that makes the North Sydney community stronger, together.

#### Eco Warrior

This person or group has made an outstanding contribution to making North Sydney cleaner and greener.

## Living Legend

This person has served the North Sydney community for more than 20 years and is an inspiration to others.

#### Next Generation

This young person or group of young people have made an outstanding contribution to the North Sydney community and are an inspiration to others. Nominees must be 24 years and under.

#### <u>Trailblazer</u>

This person or group of people are bold innovators, driving positive impact within the North Sydney community.


This year's budget of \$10,000 for the North Sydney Community Awards includes improvement costs. The event will be delivered consistent with this budget.

# **Community Builder**

CategoryCommunity BuilderNominee1. Jim BradfieldNominatorNorth Sydney Community Centre

Notably, his work aligns perfectly with our sustainability ethos. Jim's ingenious repairs keep items out of the landfill, making a vital contribution to environmental sustainability. Additionally, his ability to find innovative, cost-effective solutions helps us keep our expenses down while enhancing the overall functionality of the Centre. Jim's contributions have primarily been through his voluntary service.

He consistently goes above and beyond, generously dedicating his time and using his specialized skills and creative, MacGyver-like problem-solving abilities to address a wide range of maintenance and repair needs at the Centre. He thinks outside of the box to come up with repair solutions, making him not only an outstanding handyman but also a problem solving wizard.

Jim's unwavering generosity with his time has made the North Sydney Community Centre a hub for seamless community engagement. Jim Bradfield is more than just a handyman; he's a community builder who exemplifies the qualities of selflessness, dedication, and expertise.

Lisa coordinates the Northside Produce Markets that operates on the 1st and 3rd Saturday of each month. The Northside Produce Markets is an iconic market for North Sydney that brings together people from all walks of life, from all over Sydney.

The markets bring together a huge range of stalls that encourage sustainability, healthy eating/living and vibrancy. The Markets are an asset to North Sydney and are only possible through the passionate work from Lisa.

Community Builder 3. Mary's House Volunteer Team Mary's House Volunteer Coordinator

Mary's House Services Limited is a not-for-profit providing domestic violence services to women and their children through Mary's House refuge, and the Daisy Centre an outreach support service. Mary's House Services is driven and funded by the community to provide best-practice services. Working in partnership and collaboration with businesses, individuals, organization's, foundations, families and communities. through in-kind donations, financial contributions, and pro-bono services. We aim to create mutually beneficial relationships and help them see the direct impact of their support when working with Mary's House. Like many non-profits, the success of Mary's House in fulfilling its mission relies significantly on the invaluable contributions of volunteers.

The Volunteer Team at Mary's House stands out as the unsung heroes of our organization, playing a pivotal role in enabling us to achieve our goals. Comprising of a dedicated, loyal, and hardworking team of women and men, the Volunteer Team generously dedicates their time to enhance the well-being of the community. Their efforts go beyond the ordinary, making a substantial impact on the lives of those we support. We simply could not accomplish what we do without the unwavering support of these remarkable individuals.1 in 4 Australian women has experienced violence, emotional abuse, or economic abuse by an intimate partner.

Community Builder 3. Mary's House Volunteer Team Mary's House Volunteer Coordinator

The Mary's House refuge has accommodated 40+ women since established, 51% were families. Over the last 2 financial years MHS has provided 90+ women with casework management and over 200 women have been accepted into our evidence based therapeutic and wellbeing programs. Currently there are 30 active volunteers with over 1000 hours of support having been contributed through our community events & community programs and support in the office.

Events, like the annual Mary's House walk, highlights the community coming together to raise awareness and fundraising. The key to the walk's success is that it's a community event and the Volunteers came from local schools, local community and our regular dedicated volunteer team. Our goal is to enable our supporters to witness the direct impact of their generosity when collaborating with Mary's House.

By fostering these connections, we not only enhance the reach and effectiveness of our services but also create a sense of shared accomplishment and positive change within our community. Through this collaborative approach, we work towards a common vision of empowering and uplifting those in need, ensuring that every contribution translates into meaningful support for our mission.

Over the years, Jackie has shown excellent leadership and organizational skills, creating an inclusive space for the public at large. The Coal Loader is a unique site with a range of stakeholders and regular events, making navigating and accommodating for such things quite challenging.

Jackie shows unwavering commitment, is always professional and has proven to be an integral part in creating a welcoming space for both visitors and regular volunteers.

At Brightmore Precinct's meeting on 13 December 2023, the following Motion was passed unanimously by the 23 attendees:

That Brightmore Precinct nominate Fiona Gracie in the Category "Community Builder" for her work establishing the Cremorne Conservation Group and her pivotal and ceaseless role in attempting to preserve the houses and character of Parraween Street, and to gain State Heritage listing for the Hayden Orpheum Picture Palace.

As founder of the Cremorne Conservation Group, Fiona has engaged with the local community, which has enthusiastically come on board and taken up causes such as local heritage listings for 15 Allister Street, Cremorne, and the Holt Avenue Group of Federation houses. Fiona identified that the Hayden Orpheum Picture Palace was only on the North Sydney local heritage register, and instigated the long process to gain State Heritage listing. T

Through the establishment and work of the Cremorne Conservation Group, Fiona has inspired the community to not only recognise the historical, architectural and cultural significance of our local area, but join her in trying to protect and preserve it for future generations to appreciate.

Community Builder 8. Greenway Tenants Group Inc Bryce Gunn

The volunteers at Greenway many of them have worked as Volunteers for the last 12- 15 years. These are an exceptional group of residents who give up so much of their time to help the less fortunate residents of Greenway.

We have approximately 350 residents at Greenway, The activities that are worked by this special group of people includes, working on OzHarvest, providing close to 200 bags a week of food. This food is supplied by OzHarvest, working in the gardens, providing full office facilities in our Community Centre, providing transport in our 2 vehicles to the Hospitals Medical Centre's.

We also have Shopping and Day trips to the country. We also have a fully equipped Men's Shed staffed with volunteers. The Volunteers are great at multi tasking and appear in more than one capacity. This merry band of workers worked throughout the covid Pandemic so that the Elderly residents of Greenway felt that things were going on as usual. Without this incredible input of 1,000ss of hours they would have had a much harder time to contend with.

Community Builder 9. Bobby Babin, St John's Community Garden Yeo St, Neutral Bay Audrey Bradshaw

**Part 1:** A brief history The Neutral Bay Uniting Community Garden was founded in 2012, when a group of volunteers led by Bobby Babin decided to turn the vacant land around the church into a lush, sustainable garden for the neighborhood to enjoy. Since then, over 350 people have participated in our working bees and workshops, and we've also benefited from the support of local groups, such as the Mosman's Men's Shed, the North Shore Bombers and North Sydney Council. At night the garden is illuminated with eco-friendly LED lights, by day the community can wander through and enjoy its ever-changing landscape of greenery, colour and fragrance. The garden hosts a street library which Bobby had painted by a talented friend of his, and free wi-fi allows visitors to sit in the garden and connect with friends elsewhere.

The garden has won several awards, such as the Best Children's Garden, the Sustainability Champion Award, and the Runner Up as North Sydney's Edible Garden Award. These awards acknowledged the garden's excellence in design, innovation, education, and community engagement. The many volunteers, both past and present, feel it is now time for Bobby to be recognized for his outstanding contribution to the community in establishing this community garden.

Community Builder 9. Bobby Babin, St John's Community Garden Yeo St, Neutral Bay Audrey Bradshaw

**Part 2**: In 2023, the garden celebrated its 11th anniversary and continued to thrive. Like many organization's, COVID had an impact on volunteers however during the year the number of people committing to the monthly working bee has grown thanks to Bobby's unwavering determination and enthusiasm.

Everyone who participates is made to feel welcome by Bobby – he promotes and celebrates diversity and inclusion. Under Bobby's leadership, the working group made safe the bird bath, which has been repurposed as a succulent garden, thanks to a donation of concrete from some friendly local builders; we dug up the uneven paved pathway to St John's Child Care Centre and replaced it with an even, softer route in and out; we laid paving stones to enable easy access to the worm farm; we spread compost from the community bin around the garden and distributed mulch to protect the garden from weeds and retain moisture; we tended the citrus grove and planted new herbs in the circular garden.

Community Builder 9. Bobby Babin, St John's Community Garden Yeo St, Neutral Bay Audrey Bradshaw

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A typical working bee involves trimming back the garden, weeding and watering and catching up with each other's news; we share the cuttings of fragrant rosemary and lemon verbena with happy passers-by then we head to a local café and enjoy a well earned coffee and bite to eat, and this gives the group the opportunity to chat further and get to know each other better. One of the highlights of the year was the "Flowers with Love" campaign in November 2023, where Bobby invited the community to donate plants and cuttings to the garden, especially unusual ones, to celebrate the diversity and inclusiveness of the community. The campaign attracted over 35 donations from the public and resulted in a colourful and vibrant display of flowers and foliage in the garden.

Community Builder 9. Bobby Babin, St John's Community Garden Yeo St, Neutral Bay Audrey Bradshaw

**Part 3**: Why Bobby should be nominated for a community award As founder and leader of the Neutral Bay Uniting Community Garden, Bobby has shown dedication, passion, and innovation in creating and maintaining the garden. He has inspired and engaged hundreds of people to join the garden and to adopt sustainable practices in their own lives. He has also collaborated with various partners and stakeholders to ensure the success and longevity of the garden. He has made a positive impact on the environment, benefitting the community and the well-being of the many people who enjoy the peace and tranquility of the garden. He is a role model and a champion for community gardening as well as being a gentle soul who radiates joy and warmth to everyone he meets.

CategoryCommunity BuilderNominee10. Davie MacdonaldNominator2 x nominations received 1. Amanda Smith 2. Peter Nuttall

Davie is a stalwart of the community. He runs our precinct group and works tirelessly for our precinct and the wider community. He's caring and always available to discuss issues impacting our community. The world is a better place with people like Davie who give selflessly.

Community Builder 11. Walker St Doctors 2 x nominations received 1. Nerida McDonald 2. Trailblazer, Jean Shaw

Walker Street Doctors North Sydney has made an outstanding contribution to the North Sydney Community in the Specialised field of Primary Health Care. This contribution and excellence was recently celebrated in October 2023 by awarding Walker Street Doctors RACGP NSW&ACT Practice of the Year 2023. Walker Street Doctors has recently moved to new premises at Shop 4, 60-80 Walker St, North Sydney into larger State of the Art premises with the aims of patient empowerment and self efficacy in their health Management.

They have reduced their environmental footprint by drastically cutting down on paper and toner and as a consequence has also reduced indoor air pollutants from ink. Print to PDF is the default. They have invested heavily in a brand new Panasonic air conditioning and filtration system and monitor the air quality in the practice with CO2 Monitors. They also have vornado circulation fans and portable air purifiers in order to protect staff and vulnerable patients from circulating viruses. They invested early and heavily in infrastructure to optimize telehealth consultations which remain a large part of core business, but also in improved data capacity, a cloud based server and dedicated laptops for doctors to use at home.

# CategoryCommunity BuilderNominee11. Walker St DoctorsNominator2 x nominations received 1. Nerida McDonald 2. Trailblazer, Jean Shaw

WSD is committed to taking care of vulnerable doctors and staff, has inclusive hiring practices and has the commitment to modify equipment and conditions for staff as required. The owner, practice manager and clinical operations manager undertake regular coaching through Project X to ensure the continued financial sustainability of the practice. They have invested in equipment such as biometric scales to optimize the health and well being of their patients. They use MailChimp, their website and social media in order to update patients.

There is now pathology onsite in the form of 4Cyte Pathology. There are sit stand desks, height adjustable beds and jabra head sets for occupational health and safety. Additionally, there is a green wall/ room for staff to decompress. They are the only medium sized practice still standing who have not been taken over and absorbed by Corporate Medicine. The large beautifully designed waiting area was not designed to wait, but for evening lectures/ group consultations starting in March on a rotating roster. WSD doctors are committed to lifelong learning with one doctor achieving her Fellowship in Lifestyle medicine recently and another, her Masters in Reproductive Medicine in addition to the plethora of other qualifications being achieved by other doctors to stay at the cutting edge. The treatment room is future focused with the opportunity for nurse led care and the practice will be taking on allied health in the form of psychologist and dietician in the near future in order to broaden care for the North Sydney Community. Walker Street Doctors is a shining example of giving back to the community by providing the highest quality of primary health care in NSW &ACT.

CategoryCommunity BuilderNominee12. Samir SomaiyaNominatorCommunications Team, North Sydney Council

Samir helps bring the community together by posting to all the local community groups on Facebook to the share updates, initiatives and upcoming events from Council. Samir makes the messaging go that little bit further in the community to residents and locals.

These groups include Crows Nest St Leonard's Community, Milsons Point Community, McMahons Point Community Group, Cremorne Neutral Bay Community, Kirribilli Connections. He is the admin for Crows Nest St Leonard's Facebook group.

Community Builder 13. Coal Loader Heritage Tour Guides Leonie Netting, North Sydney Council

The Coal Loader Heritage Tour Guide team is made up of five amazing volunteers who give up their time to lead tours of the Coal Loader: Jill Howes, Susan Barisic, Sunil Loadhia, Linda Foulsham and Jill Charters. They are on a roster to guide bi-monthly tours on a Saturday for people to come down and enjoy a free guided tour of the site, immersing themselves in the history, culture and amazing adaptive re-use journey of this stunning harborside location.

The tour guide team also run free private tours during the week for every kind of group imaginable: history lovers, active seniors, gardening groups, probus clubs, nursing home citizens, 'old time' miner groups. They are fully accessible tours and the all-ability; the guides do a superb job in adapting their tour to cater for groups of every ability, interest and age.

During the course of the year, the guides take an approximately 600 plus people through the Coal Loader site, averaging almost hundred volunteer hours. The tours provide a place and purpose for people to come together and enjoy a great day out at one of Sydney's most spectacular harbourside locations.

They almost always tee it up with a lunch or morning tea and enjoy a historical video presentation in the Genia McCaffery Centre for Sustainability as well. For many groups this outing is a real highlight, reminiscing about days gone by and enjoying the grace and good humour of our lovely guides, telling the story of the Coal Loader with passion and fun.


The group have been undertaking these tours since shortly after the site opened, around ten years now. They also participate in Coal Loader events, sometimes guiding tours or even speaking - Susan for example gave a warm and funny first hand account of her days as a child growing up at the Coal Loader (her father worked her during operational times) at heritage event last year.

They are warm and engaging individuals who give up their time to create amazing experiences for people, providing education, entertainment and most of all - social connectiveness. Feedback via our customer survey is always excellent and indeed it's not uncommon for groups to rebook the following year requesting the same tour guide. Coal Loader staff are exceptionally grateful for their service to North Sydney Council and our community.

Koskela is one of Australia's most innovative and well-respected furniture and homewares designer. Sasha has been invited to be a guest speaker at the Purpose Conference. Sasha just launched Koskela's Circularity Action Plan, committing to become a fully circular business by 2027.

She also runs free workshops to teach small business on how to use the SME Climate Hub Carbon Calculator, to reduce their environmental impact and carbon emission. I think of her as a local environmental champion.

Vera Yee has led the Gardens Alive group in Waverton for the last decade. As well as leading the physical work each week, Vera has been the key link to Council on what to plant, how to ensure the 'look' is made more native and integrated, how to properly maintain the plants with minimal watering and trimming required. Eco Warrior 4. CandleXchange Eleni Pappas

The Candlexchange UpCandle Program has undeniably had a profound positive impact on the local community. By collecting over 1500 used candle containers (many from visitors to the Coal Loader Sustainability Centre markets), the program has successfully diverted a significant amount of waste from landfills, contributing to the reduction of environmental impact in the region.

The cleaned and refilled containers, which would have otherwise become waste, have been repurposed and donated to various charities. This thoughtful approach not only minimises the community's ecological footprint but also serves a dual purpose by supporting those in need.

The repurposed candle containers, donated to charities assisting survivors of domestic violence and individuals transitioning into social housing, have brought both environmental and social benefits to the local area. 
Eco Warrior 5. Christopher Niall Ben Niall



Ted approached Council about what else could be done to help home local wildlife, which led to him being involved with our Bushcare and Streets Alive team. Due to Ted's initiative, six nest boxes were installed in the trees along Warringa Road near Cammeray Park. Since positioned, the boxes are regularly inhabited. Additionally, with the aid of Council's Streets Alive program Ted has created a street garden on the public land outside his home. Street gardens create corridors that allow native wildlife to cross through.

Ted works hard in his own garden and has built a frog pond that has created a thriving habitat for local frogs and purchased a beehive for native stingless bees. He also consulted with Council's Native Havens program to recommend the best native plants to encourage wildlife to return to the area. We would love to see Ted considered for this award as he really brings joy for the next generation. 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
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Trailblazer 3. Bruce Macdonald Ian Grey, Waverton Precinct

BB2B will be celebrating its 25th Anniversary this year, it was the recipient of the Government Partnerships Award for the NSW Landcare Awards in 2015 and winner of the Biodiversity Conservation Award for the Keep Australia Beautiful NSW Sustainability Cities Award in 2023. Sissi Stewart, along with many other BB2B volunteers have planted more than 65,000 native trees, shrubs, and grasses on Boorowa Community Landcare Group properties since the project began in 2000 to help address nationally significant land degradation issues including salinity and soil erosion and to help create wildlife corridors and habit for biodiversity conservation, including for the regionally iconic and NSW-listed threatened species, the Superb Parrot. Over the past 20+ years, Sissi has contributed several hundred hours of voluntary service towards this endeavor, as well as being an ambassador for the project and guiding hand for new participants.

Sissi Stewart is one of a small core group of volunteers that have enabled this unique urban/rural Landcare partnership to persist over time, with the success of each year's planting building on the next and providing a lasting benefit for our environment and communities.

Sissi has always been a keen promoter of the BB2B project and has formed enduring relationships with Boorowa farmers and other Bushcare volunteers, as was recorded in an interview for the Special Anniversary Edition of the North Sydney Council Bushcare Newsletter in 2014 (page 4). Whilst some other volunteers have also been involved in BB2B for a lengthy period, Sissi has (by some margin) had the longest association with the project and has participated in more than twenty tree planting weekends over the past 25 years.
